Instructions: Please answer each question below by circling the number between 1 = “Not at all” to 7 “Extremely” that describes you best as a person overall. If a question can’t be answered, please just leave it out and move on.

Instructions to Calculate the Results

Total Sensitivity Score	
Add up all responses:	
Calculate the average score (sum of all responses divided by number of questions answered)	<u> </u> / <u> </u> = <u> </u>

Interpretation: An average score of greater than 5 indicates a tendency towards high sensitivity. However, individual scores may vary depending on gender, age, cultural background and other characteristics. Importantly, the score does not represent a precise indication or diagnosis but shows the likely position along a continuum of sensitivity.

Subscales

Research suggests that there are six different core aspects of sensitivity that are measured with six subscales in the HSP-R. The subscale scores below provide an understanding of how each of these core aspects of sensitivity contribute to an individual's sensitivity.
